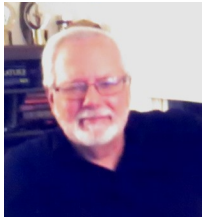

Commander's Report

"A View from the Bridge"

I have written about how "trickle down" technology from the military and commercial marine industries eventually impact recreational boating, so it is understandable how we can look forward to see what could be coming next in the recreational boaters' future. With advancing technology in AI (artificial Intelligence), drone and autonomous vehicles (UAVs), robotics, software & computer engineering (IOT), networking systems, and systems currently available to recreational boating, what is on the horizon....or is it already here?

Geo-positioning links GPS with an array of propulsion systems to maintain a steady position at sea. The military uses them for maintaining stations at sea and in commercial oil drilling operations for floating oil rigs. To further stabilize the floating platforms, gyroscopes are utilized. Both of these technologies are available to the recreational boater. Maybe not for the vast majority of the boating community, but none the less, they are here. Several companies offer "portable" gyroscope systems for vessels between 23 and 30 feet to stabilize (minimize or eliminate roll) when stopped in open water. These can be purchased with new vessels or retrofitted to existing boats. (10% to 20% added to the cost of a new boat). Larger units, for larger boats are options installed at the time they are built. (ref: internet search: Sea Keeper)

First, let's look at some technology, systems, and information currently available now:

- ◆ GPS (with resolution between 4 and 30 feet) with auto routing capability
- ◆ AIS (Automated Information System for anti-collision)
- ◆ Auto-pilot
- ◆ Forward scanning sonar
- ◆ Connectivity :
 - NMEA 2000 on-board networking
 - Bluetooth technology
 - IOT (internet of things)
- ◆ Electronic charts (that can update weekly)
- ◆ Weather information
- ◆ Sea state conditions (real time data from NOAA weather buoys)
- ◆ Boat monitoring systems
- ◆ Remote internet cameras
- ◆ Tide and current information
- ◆ On board wind speed and direction indicators
- ◆ Propulsion systems (bow, stern thrusters; twin screws; counter rotating single screw props)

Put it all together, throw in a little Artificial Intelligence, some UAV (Unmanned Autonomous Vehicle) technology, a solid internet connection, and a Virtual Reality headset, and you can take your boat out from your living room! All you need is someone to spray some salt water on your face once in a while, and to keep the Dark "n" Stormy's coming.

With all that said and done, I really believe nothing can replace the wind in your face, a boat under your feet, your ability to process all the information yourself, and navigate your boat harmoniously with nature. (Virtual/In-Person—we are still working on time/date/location)

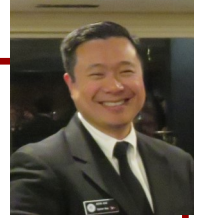

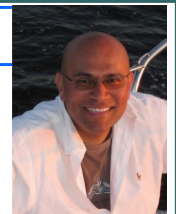

Member's Article - I was thinking—'What if...?'

NOAA predicated that the 2021 hurricane season is 'likely' to host between 13 and 20 named storms (wind speeds of 39 mph or greater), 6 to 10 hurricanes (wind speeds of 74 mph or higher) and 3 to 5 **major** hurricanes (with wind speeds of 111 mph and above). Believe it or not, the National Weather Service started tracking the 1st major storm on May 20th just east-northeast of Bermuda. In addition, the "new normal," for the average Atlantic hurricane season (June 1st through November 30th) has been changed to 14 named storms, 7 hurricanes and 3 major hurricanes.

With news like that it is no wonder that Secretary of Commerce Gina Raimondo stated as part of the 2021 NOAA release, "Now is the time for communities along the coast-line... to get prepared..." and that includes boaters! So even though it's a hot and steamy Summer, which is prime boating time, it is also prime time for stormy weather especially along the coastal areas like here on Long Island. As boaters, we always need to be alert to changing weather conditions and do our 'advanced planning' for that quick storm that seems to appear from nowhere.



As boaters here on Long Island, we know that those frequent thunderstorms can be easily detected and tracked by radar. No radar on the boat! You can use your VHF to stay tuned to weather reports. In fact, today's cell phones have a greater capacity with so many towers about. Install a 'weather alert' app on your phone to help to keep important weather information current. Knowing **what's about to happen** won't have you trying to secure your boat in adverse storm conditions. Be prepared with a supply of fenders, lengths of longer lines and a larger anchor as part of your 'storm plan.' And while we're thinking of long range planning, don't forget to take a look at your insurance coverage. Know what's covered and what's not. Don't be surprised after the storm that your not covered because you didn't fulfill your responsibilities before or during the storm.



Planning to act earlier not later is always better. Think about the "What if..." situations and plan for them. For example, 'What if...' the water level rises. Rising and falling water can change dramatically in marinas and narrow canals depending on the wind direction. Be prepared for this kind of storm event. 'What if...' you can't traverse to a safe harbor because the bridge clearance is reduced (because of heightened water levels) or the bridge will remain in the down position to facilitate road evacuations. Traveling during approaching storms may have many challenges and having a plan that put you into action at the first sign of impending danger is a the safer idea.

As you secure your boat, reduce wind strain by taking down Biminis, Sails and other canvas. Make sure that the battery is fully charged—your bilge pumps may be called on for extra duty. Dock lines need to be long enough to allow for adjusted water levels and put away any items that may be blown about due to high winds.

The best prevention from being caught in a storm is 'being prepared' with knowledge. Knowing what to do and knowing the appropriate actions to take will minimize stress while keeping you and your boat safer. What better way to be prepared then to take the **Hurricane Preparation for Boaters** Seminar from USPS. This 2 hour seminar will give you some valuable tips and provide you with knowledge you need to be prepared for those 'What if...' storm scenarios.

May 10 Open House Meeting

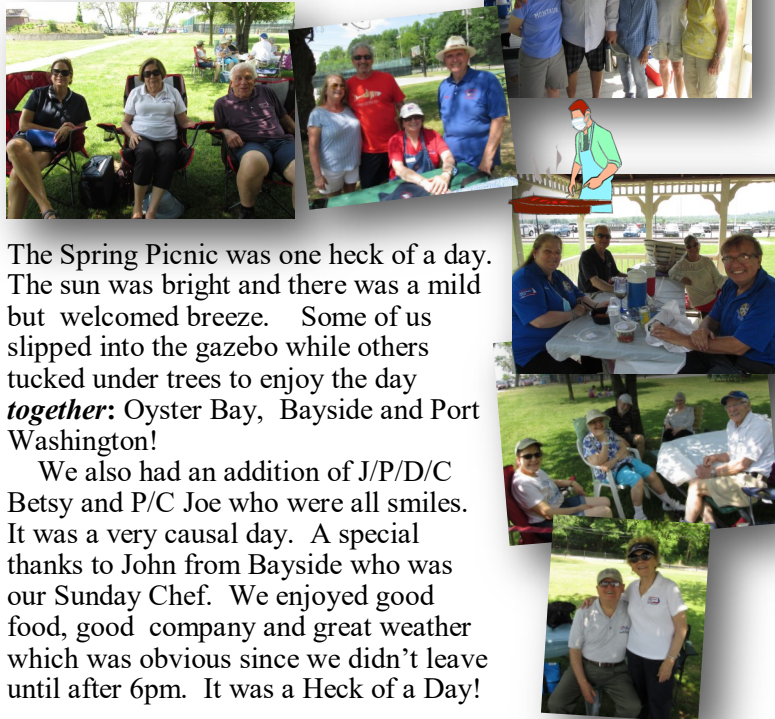

Safety Article

Cruise Paddling can be fun for everyone!

What is the fast growing water sport in America? All **paddle sports** – kayaking, canoeing and rowing. This marvelous water sport only requires human power. No sails, no engines. And you can paddle almost everywhere: in bays, in rivers, in streams and, with care, in the oceans. In fact, almost every water location today seems to have a perfect spot for a paddle cruise. Before you start, know the safety basics to help make your paddle adventure not only fun but safe as well.

As with all water sports - **Think Smart**. Plan your paddle cruise carefully. You don't want to be paddle for hours and when it's time to go back you're too exhausted to reach your home shore. Start out small. Learn how far you can paddle in 1 hour and gradually increase your distance and endurance. Plan your paddle cruises to include rest breaks and drink stops along the way. Consider stops that include a shore break. Most importantly, stop and enjoy the surrounding shoreline and beauty of the water during these well-deserved rest stops.

Practice your **Paddler-Overboard** routine. Always include practicing getting in and out of your craft. As well as helping your paddling buddy if they happen to be abruptly ejected during a pleasure cruise.

Canoes and Kayaks come in many different designs and choosing the right one is a personal call. But one thing for sure, no matter the size of your vessel, always load your craft with the heavier items in the rear to middle. As with other watercrafts, you want the bow to ride higher than the stern so the boat will move more swiftly through the water.

Always think "FREEBOARD." The Coast Guard recommends that you leave 6 inches of freeboard in a standard loaded canoe. Kayaks may be a bit different but freeboard is the optimal word here as with all water crafts. Stow items as low as possible in the boat but remember to leave a comfortable space within your

canoe or kayak for the paddler.

Keeping items dry may be a problem. But, it is easily handled by double sealing items in waterproof bags. Consider a few important items needed in your **DRY BAG** like socks, sweatshirt, food, charts of area, cell phone and/or handheld radio. And don't forget to make sure you secure your DRY BAG to the canoe just in case your boat tips over or capsizes. If capsized—you'll know where your DRY BAG is—attached to your vessel and not at the bottom of the river.

Many say it is easy to be a paddler especially if you love being outdoors and exploring. So long as you are wearing the appropriate buoyancy rated life jacket, you can feel as snug as a bug in a rug. Canoeing is ideal for friends and family, young and old, alike. Still need more before you go Paddling. Take the **America's Boating Club Paddling Seminar**. It is 2 hours of great tips for all paddlers.

Well, the next questions may be...Where can I paddle on Long Island? As you see from



the map below there are many

locations on both the north and south shores from beginners to advanced rowers. There can be some restrictions in certain areas so make sure you check out all the rules before you depart on your paddle cruise.

Oh, I almost forgot. You can download this great app for your phone called **GO PADDLING APP**. It has over 22,000 locations around the nation to paddle your days away. 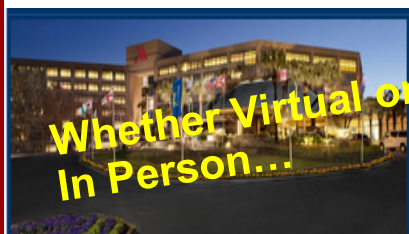

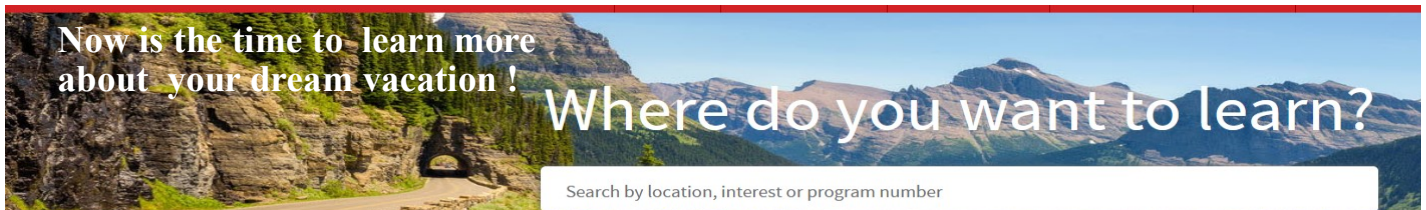
